“Why am I doing what I am doing?”



Above is an image of Christ our Saviour. It is a 16th century Icon known as 'The Moscow Christ our Saviour'. I have carried it with me and shared it with thousands of people over many years. The strength of Christ's face initially drew me to it.

The Icon of St Mary MacKillop in the Basilica of St Patrick, Fremantle captures the action and the spirit of Mary of the Cross who despite trials and challenges was a person committed to the living out of God's Will in her life.



“Never see a need without trying to do something about it” was Mary's advice to her Sisters. This is the background to Mary's outreach. She said:

“Have courage and pray earnestly” (1883).

“Let no obstacle deter us from proceeding with courage” (1893).

“I will not shrink from any cross or trial.”

St Eugene de Mazenod, Founder of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate was fired with the same spirit. He told his Oblates 'Leave nothing undared for the Kingdom of God'.



We are all CALLED to make this world a better place. The journey of our life needs to be a response to God's CALL. St Eugene would say:
